HOW TO TRANSFER TO THE EVSC or WITHIN THE EVSC

For an application for transfer to a school within the Evansville Vanderburgh School Corporation from outside Vanderburgh County, please call the Center for Family, School, and Community Partnerships at 812-435-8463. Parents within Vanderburgh County, that have specific medical, Choice, adjustment and working-parent transfer situations, who would like to transfer from their child's home school to another school within the EVSC, should also call the Center for Family, School, and Community Partnerships.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE PROGRAM STUDENTS AND ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

High school principals approve enrollment of foreign exchange program students. Students enrolling without a birth certificate issued in the United States and/or living with parents/guardians in your district will be permitted to enroll. Passport information can be accepted as legal verification. IMMUNIZATIONS

Immunizations are required by Indiana State Law. When children enroll in EVSC schools for the first time or any subsequent time and at any level, the parent/guardian must show written proof of immunizations or have on file a current religious or medical exemption. The immunization waiver for a medical exemption requires a written diagnosis by a physician stating that a student has a medical condition that precludes receiving certain vaccines. A waiver of immunization because of religious reason requires a letter from the parent/guardian. Both waivers must be updated yearly. **A child may not be permitted to attend school beyond the first day of school without furnishing written proof of immunizations, or a request for a waiver. PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

Written documentation of a physical examination by a physician or nurse practitioner is required for students entering EVSC for the first time, students enrolling in kindergarten, students entering the sixth grade, and students entering the ninth grade. A test for tuberculosis is recommended. Physical Examination Forms are available at the school; at the Center for Family, School, and Community Partnerships, 123 Main Street, Evansville (corner of Main and 2nd Streets in downtown Evansville); or may be accessed online at www.evscschools.com, click on Educational Support Service at the top of the page, then click on the "forms" button.

BUS TRANSPORTATION

Bus schedules and bus stops for students will be mailed out before the start of school on postcards to families in the EVSC and communicated through Connect-ED family notification phone calls. Parents may also call the Office of Transportation at 812-435-1BUS for this information. Individuals are encouraged to call prior to the first week of school, to have their questions answered. The office is open year round.

Transportation to the Southern Indiana Career and Technical Center – For students attending classes at the Southern Indiana Career and Technical Center, transportation is provided. After bus arrival at students' home schools, students attending the morning sessions at the center will ride by school bus to the Southern Indiana Career and Technical Center, leaving the home school at 7:15 a.m. and returning to their home schools in time for lunch. Students enrolled in the afternoon session leave their home school on the school bus at 11:55 a.m. and are returned at the end of school.

MINIMUM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR SCHOOL ENTRY
INDIANA STATE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH
QUICK REFERENCE for 2011-12 SCHOOL YEAR

When a student enrolls in a school corporation, for the first time or any subsequent time and at any level, his parents must show either that he/she has been immunized or that a current religious or medical objection is on file. Parents must provide the School Corporation with complete immunization records prior to the beginning of the school year.

MINIMUM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS ENROLLED AT PRE-KINDERGARTEN:

- 4 doses of diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis (DTaP), diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), pediatric diphtheria-tetanus (DT) vaccine, or any combination of the three are required;
- 3 doses of either oral polio vaccine (OPV) or inactivated polio vaccine (IPV), in any combination;
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B vaccine (3rd dose must be on or after 24 weeks of age);
- 1 dose of measles (rubeola) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 1 dose of rubella (German measles) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 1 dose of mumps vaccine, on or after the first birthday.
- 1 dose of varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccine, on or after the first birthday, separated by 3 months, or physician written documentation of history of chickenpox disease, including month and year of disease. 2 doses is recommended.

MINIMUM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS ENROLLED AT KINDERGARTEN:

- 5 doses of diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis (DTaP), diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), or pediatric diphtheria-tetanus (DT) vaccine. (4 doses are acceptable if the 4th dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday and at least 6 months after the 3rd dose);
- 4 doses of any combination of IPV or OPV. The 4th dose must be administered on or after the 4th birthday, and at least 6 months after the previous dose. (3 doses of all OPV or all IPV are acceptable if the 3rd dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday and at least 6 months after the 2nd dose);
- 2 doses of measles (rubeola) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 2 doses of mumps vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 1 dose of rubella (German measles) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 3 doses of hepatitis B vaccine (3rd dose must be given on or after 24 weeks of age and no earlier than 16 weeks after the 1st dose); and
- 2 doses of varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccine, on or after the first birthday, and separated by 3 months, or physician written documentation of history of chickenpox disease, including month and year of disease.

MINIMUM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS ENROLLED AT GRADE ONE:

- 5 doses of diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis (DTaP), diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), or pediatric diphtheria-tetanus (DT) vaccine. (4 doses are acceptable if the 4th dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday and at least 6 months after the 3rd dose);
- 4 doses of any combination of IPV or OPV by age 4-6, or 3 doses of all OPV or all IPV are acceptable if the 3rd dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday;
- 2 doses of measles (rubeola) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 2 doses of mumps vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 1 dose of rubella (German measles) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B vaccine (3rd dose must be on or after 24 weeks of age);

- 2 doses of varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccine, on or after the first birthday, and separated by 3 months, or physician written documentation of history of chickenpox disease, including month and year of disease.

MINIMUM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS ENROLLED AT GRADE TWO, THREE, FOUR, and FIVE :

- 5 doses of diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis (DTaP), diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), pediatric diphtheria-tetanus (DT) or Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine [7 Years of Age or older]; 4 doses are acceptable if the 4th dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday and at least 6 months after the 3rd dose;
- 4 doses of any combination of IPV or OPV by age 4-6, 3 doses of all OPV or all IPV are acceptable if the 3rd dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday;
- 2 doses of measles (rubeola) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 2 doses of mumps vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 1 dose of rubella (German measles) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B vaccine (3rd dose must be on or after 24 weeks of age);
- 1 dose of varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccine, on or after the first birthday, or written history of disease. *Parental history of chickenpox disease is acceptable proof of immunity. A signed written statement from the parent/guardian indicating month and year of disease is sufficient.*

MINIMUM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDENTS ENROLLED IN GRADE 6-12

and for Students in Ungraded Classrooms Who are 13 Years of Age or Older on August 1st of the Current School Year.

- 5 doses of diphtheria-tetanus-acellular pertussis (DTaP), diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), pediatric diphtheria-tetanus (DT); or Tetanus-diphtheria (Td) vaccine [7 years of age or older]; 4 doses are acceptable if the 4th dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday and at least 6 months after the 3rd dose;
- 4 doses of any combination of IPV or OPV by age 4-6, (3 doses of all OPV or all IPV are acceptable if the 3rd dose was administered on or after the 4th birthday);
- 2 doses of measles (rubeola) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 2 doses of mumps vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 1 dose of rubella (German measles) vaccine, on or after the first birthday;
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B vaccine (3rd dose must be on or after 24 weeks of age);
- 2 doses of varicella (Chicken Pox) vaccine, on or after the first birthday, separated by age-appropriate interval, or written history of disease. *Parental history of chickenpox disease is acceptable proof of immunity. A signed written statement from the parent/guardian indicating month and year of disease is sufficient.*
- 1 dose of tetanus-diphtheria-acellular pertussis vaccine (Tdap), given on or after 10 years of age;
- 1 dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV4)

ED CENTER PROGRAM

ED CENTER PROGRAM

The ED Center (Extended Day Care) Program is available for children who need care before and/or after school. Children may attend before school from 6:30 a.m. until school starts and from the end of the school day until 6:00 p.m. A fee will be charged to parents who are late picking up their children.

Any child enrolled in elementary school, K-6 is eligible to attend on a first-come, first-served basis. Fees must be paid by the first day of the week of attendance. If children are in attendance only part of the week, full payment is expected for the entire week.

Parents are responsible for all transportation.

Children in the morning program will be able to purchase breakfast at the school cafeteria. Snacks will be provided for the afternoon program. Opportunities will be provided for study and enrichment. The ED Centers have space for students to do homework, read for pleasure, and participate in recreational activities.

RATES

The fee on a weekly basis is \$15.00 per week for the morning program only; \$35.00 per week for the afternoon only; and \$50.00 per week, per child, for both morning and afternoon.

DROP IN RATES

Parents may choose to have their children attend on a daily, rather than a weekly basis. The fee on a daily basis is \$8.00 per day for the morning program and \$13.00 for the afternoon program.

LATE CHARGES

\$10 will be charged if parent arrives between 6:01 pm and 6:19 pm

\$20 will be charged if parent arrives at 6:20 pm or later

EMERGENCY DAYS

The ED Centers are open only when schools are open. If schools are closed because of a snow day or other emergency, the ED Centers will be closed. No charge will be made for that day. In the event that an emergency day is made up, the ED Center will be open. A charge will be added for the ED Center Program. If there is a delayed opening of school or early dismissal due to an emergency, such as a snowstorm, the following procedures will be followed:

- The ED Centers will open at 6:30 am even if there is a delayed opening.
- If school is canceled after a delayed opening, parents will be notified to pick up their children.
- If an early dismissal occurs before noon, the Ed Center Program will be canceled for that day.
- If an early dismissal occurs after noon, the ED Center will be opened as soon as school is dismissed and will operate on a regular schedule. In the event of severe weather, parents are asked to pick up their students as soon as is possible to help protect the safety of the ED Center staff, as well as the students and parents.
- Delaware, Evans and Lincoln ED Centers will operate on each individual schools' calendar.

EVSC FOOD/NUTRITION
HEALTHY EATING HELPS MAKE THE GRADE
Children who are not hungry feel better, learn better, and behave better.

Breakfast and lunch are available on regularly scheduled days in EVSC's schools. Meal serving times are scheduled by the administration at each school. All menus for the EVSC schools meet the dietary guidelines as established by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA).

Elementary and middle school menus are published in the *Evansville Courier & Press* each day during the school year. High school menus are announced in a daily bulletin. Menus and nutrient information are posted on the EVSC website <http://www.evscschools.com>.

Ala Carte items, ranging in price from \$.25 to \$3.00, are available for 4th and 5th graders and middle and high school students in the school cafeterias. Foods offered for sale in the school cafeterias comply with the guidelines as outlined in the EVSC Wellness Policy. (Policy 8510-See www.evscschools.com, By-Laws and Policies)

Meal payments using cash or check may be made at your child's school. If paying by check, the check is to be made out to the school cafeteria. Your phone number must be on the check. Charges are permitted on a very limited basis through 8th grade. Do contact the EVSC Office of Food & Nutrition at 435-8262 should you have difficulty in making meal payments. Paying for your child's meals on-line is also a payment option. If desired, you may use VISA or Mastercard to make payments into the student's meal account. A \$2.50 fee per transaction will be charged for those making on-line deposits to an account. To access this service, go to www.EZSchoolPay.com. You will need your child's seven digit EVSC Student ID number. This number can be found on the pre-printed free and reduced price meal application that every student receives or on the opening page of EdEase Parent Access. Even if you do not use EZ School Pay to make on-line payments, the service allows you to check your child's meal account history and balance at no charge.

Families may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Some EVSC students will be pre-approved for free meals and other benefits and will be notified. Pre-printed family applications, for free and/or reduced price meals and other benefits, will be distributed to all other students. A household having more than one child enrolled in EVSC may receive multiple applications. However, just one of these applications needs to be completed and returned with one child to his/her school office. Students approved for free or reduced price meals are eligible to receive free text books and other benefits.

If your child has special dietary needs that require a menu change, a Diet Prescription for Meals at School form may be obtained from the cafeteria manager or school nurse. The form must be signed by a physician or recognized medical authority and returned to the cafeteria. In most instances, we are able to make the necessary adjustments.

SCHOOL UNIFORM DRESS CODES

According to the EVSC School Rules, the EVSC Dress Code for ALL EVSC schools follows the Indiana Department of Education Code 15, which states:

Appropriate dress and personal grooming are required of each student as a vital part of maintaining the educational environment. Modes of grooming or styles of attire which detract from a good teaching/learning situation are not acceptable. It is required that coats and backpacks are secured in lockers upon arrival to school and remain there until the end of the school day. Extremes shall be avoided in all areas of dress and grooming including body piercing. (Body piercing, except for ears, is prohibited in elementary and middle schools.) All decisions about appropriate dress and grooming will be made by the schools' administrators. Students in violation of the dress code will be asked to correct the violation prior to returning to the classroom and could face further disciplinary action.

Some EVSC schools have adopted a more specific dress code, to best serve the needs of individual school communities. The following are those specific schools and the dress code or school uniform required.

Academy for Innovative Studies Student Appearance and Dress Code Policy 2011-12

Appropriate Sizes

Students shall wear clothing of appropriate size as determined by the administration or designee exercising his or her judgment. The size of shirts and pants shall be appropriate to the student's body size and shall not be unduly oversized or undersized.

Shirts

Shirts shall be Polo Style with a collar and solid colors with no markings. No strips or decorations will be allowed. Exceptions will be determined on a case by case basis at the discretion of the administration.

Pants

Pants shall be worn with a belt that is properly fastened. Pants shall be worn so that the waistband is worn at the waist and not below the waist. Blue jeans and uniform style pants in black, navy, and tan are the only acceptable colors for pants. Tears or holes will not be allowed.

Shorts

Students may wear hemmed shorts that are blue jean, navy, tan, or black only, if the wearing of shorts has not been revoked and they are appropriate for school. In all situations in which shorts are permissible to be worn, the shorts shall be worn at the waist with a belt and shall extend to the tip of the fingers when both arms are extended by the side. The appropriate length of the shorts shall be determined by the administrative staff.

Caze Elementary Dress for Success Code 2011-12

Shirts

Short or long sleeve polo style shirts with a collar and buttons (any solid color) without logos

Shirts will be tucked into pants.

Fridays: School logo t-shirts from McGary, Caze or Harrison

Sweatshirts/Sweaters

Crewneck (any solid color) without logos

Pants/Shorts

Colors: Solid tan, black or navy

Dress Pants: Worn at the waist

Shorts: Worn at the waist, length mid-way down the thigh

Capri and Crop Pants for girls: Worn at the waist

Skirts/Skorts (girls only)

Colors: tan, black or navy knee-length or longer

Belts

Boys and Girls in grades 3-5 will wear belts if their pants have belt loops.

Shoes

Closed-toe and closed heel shoes must be worn.

Tennis shoes or dress shoes must be fastened (either tied or Velcro)

Spirit and other free dress days will occur during the month.

No denim

Shorts must be at least fingertip length & not fall below the knee

Skorts & skirts must be within two inches of the knee

Must be securely fastened at the waist and fit appropriately

Closed toe & closed back of shoe

Presentation:

Laces must be tied and match, no neon permitted

Both shoes must match

Socks

Color:

Any color, must match

Sweatshirts & Sweaters

Style:

Crew, Vests or V-neck only, no hoodies

Plain, no trim color, may have a small logo

Presentation:

Polo shirts must be worn underneath all sweatshirts and sweaters

Sweaters and sweatshirts must fit appropriately

Color:

Solid colors: red, yellow, blue, green, pink, purple, white, orange, grey

No neon colors

Belts

Style:

Plain buckle, no over-sized buckles

Presentation:

Belts must be worn at all times.

Fitted and secured around the waist

K-2 students are not required to wear belts

Any color

Spirit Wear

Issued only by Cedar Hall Community School, or purchased from the Shop EVSC website, www.shopevsc.com. All other shirts and sweatshirts are prohibited.

In all other matters of question, the EVSC Dress Code continues to hold precedent. The school administration is the final authority on compliance.

Shirts

Collared polo/dress shirt with long or short sleeves, any color, solid or striped

Sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts and vests (no hoods) may be worn

Solid colored turtle tees/turtlenecks may be worn under polo/dress shirts

Shirts can have small logos (2" or less) – no writing or images

Pants

Solid color khaki, black, brown, or navy dress pants/shorts/shirts (No denim or leggings)

Shorts/skirts must be knee length

Pants, shorts, skirts must be worn at the waist

Belts are to be worn with all items

Fridays

Bear Wear Fridays will be observed – school/organization/athletic tee shirts and sweatshirts permitted

Dexter Dress for Success at Dexter School

Shirts

Students may wear long or short sleeved solid color, collared shirts. Button up, collared, solid colored blouses and shirts are also permitted. Shirts should be tucked in at all times.

School t-shirts may be worn on Fridays.

Sweaters

Solid colored sweatshirts and sweaters can be worn over the collared shirts. Hoodies should not be worn to school.

Pants/Shorts

Solid khaki, navy, or black pants may be worn; cargo pants are not a part of the dress for success initiative. Solid color khaki, navy, or black shorts which fall at mid-thigh length may be worn. Khaki, navy and black skorts or scooters may be worn. Khaki, navy, and black capri/crop pants may be worn.

Belts

Third through fifth grade students must wear a solid navy, black, or brown belt. Belts are not required for kindergarten through second grade.

Shoes

Tennis shoes must be worn during gym. Closed toe/closed heel shoes may be worn. Socks or tights must be worn at all times.

Shirts/Tops

Style: Short or long sleeve polo style shirts with a collar and buttons and without logos OR polo shirt from any college/university tucked into pants.

Polo Colors

Any solid color

*Solid color T-shirts, long sleeved mock/turtleneck shirts, or button down collar shirts, without graphics or logos, may be worn under polo shirts

Friday Dress

Fairlawn NEU t-shirt or sweatshirt

Sweatshirts / Sweaters / Jackets

Style: Crewneck sweatshirt or sweater without logos OR crewneck or sweater with a school logo from any university/college, Fairlawn or Harrison Attendance District

Colors

Any solid color

*No hoodies except Fairlawn NEU hoodie

Pants/Shorts/Skirts/Skorts

Colors: Solid tan, khaki, or navy, NO jeans. All worn at waste.

Shorts

Worn at waist, length mid-way down thigh.

Capri and Crop Pants/Girls

Worn at waist, not rolled at bottom

Skirts/Skorts/Dresses/Jumpers (girls only)

Worn at waist, knee-length or longer

*Solid color leggings may be worn under skirts, dresses, or jumpers

Belts

Boys and girls in grades 3-5 must wear a belt every day. Belts must be plain black or brown without an oversized buckle. Belts must be buckled and worn appropriately.

Shoes

Closed-toe and closed heel shoes must be worn. Tennis shoes are required daily. If dress shoes are worn, shoes must be fastened (either tied or Velcro). No flip-flops.

Socks

Socks must be of the same solid color.

Accessories

Post earrings, watches, and a medical bracelet are the only acceptable forms of accessories. Tattoos (permanent, temporary, or personally made) are prohibited.

Hair

Hair must be neat, clean, and natural color. Hair may not distract from the educational process.

Glenwood Leadership Academy School Dress Guidelines 2011-12

Pants and Shorts

Pants or shorts are permitted in the colors of khaki/tan/navy and must be of a plain nature with no logos. Pants and shorts must not be too tight or too loose and are to be worn at the waist. Shorts must be at least mid way down the thigh. Capri and cropped pants are acceptable for girls. Capri, cropped pants, and shorts are to be worn only until fall break and not again until after spring break. Jeans are not allowed.

Skirts

Girls may wear khaki/tan/navy skirts. Skirts must be knee length or longer. Jean skirts are not allowed. Skirts must be tucked into skirts.

Shirts

Glenwood Leadership Academy students may wear red, white, gray, black, and navy blue. Shirts must be solid color polo-style or collared button down. Solid color sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts, and vests are also permitted in approved colors. Hooded sweatshirts are not allowed to be worn during the school day. A long sleeved polo-style shirt in approved school colors is also acceptable. Long sleeved undershirts may be worn under the polo shirts but must be in the approved colors. Tanks may be worn under the uniform shirt but only in the approved colors. Only the top button of the two-buttoned style polo shirt is allowed to be unbuttoned; for polo-style shirts with three or more buttons, the top two buttons may remain unbuttoned. All shirts that extend beyond the hipbone are to be tucked in and belted. If a student has pants/shorts/skirt with an elastic waistband, a belt will not be required.

Shoes

Shoes must be worn at all times and must have a back. Shoes with strings must be tied and those with Velcro must be fastened. Students cannot wear flip-flops, crocs, or house shoes at any time.

Socks and Tights

Students must wear solid color socks or tights at all times of the following color choices: white, brown, black, navy, or tan. If tights are worn, they must be tights with feet, and must be in the approved colors.

Accessories

Earrings, a single-strand necklace, and watches are acceptable forms of accessories. If necklaces are long in length, they must be tucked inside the shirt. Bracelets or armbands of any kind are NOT to be worn. Head wraps or scarves are prohibited. Body piercings, except for ears, is prohibited. Refer to EVSC district dress code for specific details on this. Accessories must not be distracting to the educational process.

Hair

Hair must be neat and clean and is not to be taken down and restyled during the school day. If hair is braided at the beginning of the school day, it is to remain braided until the end of the school day. Hair colors and styles must not be distracting to the educational process.

Additional reminder: Electronic devices must be put away prior to entering the building and out of sight of staff members. If a staff member sees them and asks for them, students must comply. We discourage these items being brought to school and will not be held responsible if they are lost or stolen.

Harrison High School "Dress for Success" Policy for 2011-2012

Tops

Solid/striped collared polo/dress shirts with long/short sleeves (shirts must be tucked in)
Small logos – no writing or images
Sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts and vests (no hoodies)
Permitted: Solid colored tees/turtlenecks worn underneath polo/dress shirt

Bottoms

Solid color khaki, black, or navy dress pants/shorts/skirts
Belts are to be worn with all items
Shorts/skirts must be knee length
Pants/shorts/skirts must be worn at the waist - no sagging

Shirts

No house shoes or flip-flops
All accessories will follow established EVSC dress code
Spirit Days: Jeans without holes; school tee-shirt

All decisions about appropriate dress and grooming will be made by the schools' administrators. Students found to be in violation of the dress policy will be asked to correct the article found to be in violation prior to returning to the classroom and could face further disciplinary action.

Harper Dress for Success Policy for 2011-12

Tops

Short or long sleeve collared polo style or oxford style dress shirt in any solid color, with the exception of neon colors. School logos only are allowed. Shirts must be buttoned with the exception of the top button.

Polo shirts may be worn without tucking in. Collared shirts must be tucked in with a belt for students in grades 4 - 5.

Undershirts need to be a plain solid color, if worn.

Sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts, and vests of any solid color are permitted when worn over a collared shirt or polo. School logos only are allowed. Neon colors are not permitted.

Bottoms

Pants and shorts should be dress style, plain, in solid shades of tan, black, navy, or gray without holes or frays of any kind. Cargo pants are not permitted.

Females may wear plaid skirts/jumpers, or jumpers in tan, black, navy, or gray. Tights or leggings to the ankle will be permitted with skirts or jumpers.

Pants, shorts, skirts, capris, and skorts should be cotton, cotton blend, wool, or corduroy and be to the fingertips or longer.

Jeans, denim, or stretch material are not permitted.

Shoes

Shoes need to have a closed back.

Other

General success rules: all clothing must be properly fitted, caps and head gear should be removed upon entering the school, piercings allowed in the ears only, hair should be kept neat, clean and non-distracting.

Spirit Days will be given throughout the year on designated dates. Students may wear sweatshirts, t-shirts, and/or hoodies displaying logos of Washington Middle School, Harper, or Bosse on Spirit Days.

Coats and backpacks (which have to “fit” in the lockers) need to be secured in lockers before homeroom and remain there until the end of the school day.

All decisions about appropriate dress and grooming will be made by the school administrator/designee.

Helfrich Park STEM Academy 2011-12

Shirts

Students must wear collared shirts, with buttons. Shirts may be polo or oxford, be of any plain color, striped or plaid and not have monograms over 3 inches.

Pants

Pants must not have any holes, straps, drag the floor or be oversized. Belts are expected to be worn. Sweatpants of any form are not acceptable. Shorts must be a minimum of finger length and will be up to the discretion of the administrators. Capri pants/shorts are encouraged for female students.

Sweatshirts

Hooded shirts or sweatshirts are not allowed during the school day. Crew neck sweatshirts are allowed.

Lincoln School 2011-12

Pants and Shorts

Pants or shorts are permitted in the colors of black, khaki/tan, or navy blue. Pants and shorts must be of a plain nature with no logos. Pants and shorts must not be too tight or too loose. Pants and shorts are to be worn at the waist. Shorts must be at least mid way down the thigh. Capri and crop pants are acceptable for girls. Jeans are not allowed.

Skirts

Girls may wear khaki/tan skirts. Skirts must be knee length or longer. Jean skirts are not allowed. Skirts must be tucked into skirts.

Shirts

All K-8 students may wear red, white, blue, or gray shirts. Lincoln students may also wear purple, gold or black shirts (school colors). Shirts must be solid color polo-style or collared button down. Solid color sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts, and vests are also permitted in approved colors. A long sleeved polo-style shirt in approved school colors is also acceptable. School logo t-shirts are an exception and are allowed. However, school logo t-shirts must display the school colors of the K-8 school or an EVSC high school. **Hooded sweatshirts are not allowed** to be worn during the school day. **All shirts** are to be TUCKED IN and BELTED. If a student has pants/shorts/skirt that have an elastic waist band, a belt will not be required.

Shoes

Shoes must be worn at all times. Shoes with strings must be tied and those with Velcro must be fastened. Students cannot wear flip-flops, crocs, or house shoes at any time.

Socks and Tights

Students must wear **solid color** socks or tights at all times of the following color choices: white, brown, black, navy, or tan. If tights are worn, they must be tights with feet.

Accessories

Earrings, a necklace, and watches are acceptable forms of accessories. Any bracelets or armbands prohibited by the school corporation will be strictly enforced. Refer to the EVSC district dress code for specific details. Accessories must not be distracting to the educational process.

Hair

Lodge Community School K-8 School Dress Guidelines 2011-12

Pants and Shorts

Pants or shorts are permitted in the colors of **khaki or navy blue**. Pants and shorts must be of plain nature with no logos. Pants and shorts must not be too tight or too loose. Pants and shorts are to be worn at the waist. Shorts must be at least midway down the thigh. Capri and crop pants are acceptable for girls. Jeans are not allowed.

Skirts

Skirts are permitted in the colors of **khaki or navy blue**. Skirts must be knee length or longer. Jean skirts are not allowed. Skirts must be tucked into skirts.

Shirts

All K-8 students may wear **any solid color polo-style or collared button down**. Solid color sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts, and vests are also permitted in **any solid color**. Any solid color long sleeved polo-style shirt is also acceptable. A plain, long sleeved, round neck shirt that is the same color as the polo may be worn under a short-sleeved polo in solid colors in colder weather. Lodge Community School logo t-shirts and Bosse High School logo t-shirts are an exception and are allowed. However, school logo t-shirts must display the school colors of the K-8 school or its feeder high school (Lodge/Bosse). **Hooded sweatshirts are NOT allowed** to be worn during the school day. **All shirts** are to be **TUCKED IN** and **BELTED**. If a student has pants/shorts/skirt with an elastic waist band, a belt will not be required.

Shoes

Shoes must be worn at all times. Only low top tennis shoes will be allowed. Shoes with strings must be tied and those with Velcro must be fastened. Students cannot wear high-top tennis shoes, boots, flip-flops, crocs, or house shoes at any time.

Socks and Tights

Students must wear **solid color** socks or tights at all times of the following color choices: white, brown, black, navy or tan. If tights are worn, they must be tights with feet. No leggings.

Accessories

Earrings, a necklace and watches are acceptable forms of accessories. Any bracelets or armbands prohibited by the school corporation will be strictly enforced. Refer to the EVSC district dress code for specific details. Accessories must not be distracting to the educational process.

Hair

Hair must be neat and clean. Hair is not to be taken down and restyled during the school day. If hair is braided at the beginning of the school day, it is to remain braided until the end of the school day. Hair color and styles must not be distracting to the educational process.

The EVSC Dress Code continues to hold precedent over matters that may be in question. The school administration and designees have and are the final authorities on compliancy.

McGary Middle School Modified Dress Code 2011-12

Shirts

Short or long sleeve polo style shirts with a collar and buttons (any solid color) without logos
School logo crewneck t-shirts from McGary, Harrison, Fairlawn, or Caze
If layered, shirt under polo must be crewneck

Sweatshirts / Sweaters

Crewneck (any solid color) without logos
Crewneck sweatshirts with school logos from McGary, Harrison, Fairlawn, or Caze

Pants/Shorts (uniform style only – cargo pants not permitted)

Acceptable colors: Solid tan, black, or navy
Dress pants (plain, worn at the waist)
Shorts (plain, worn at the waist, and must be mid-way down the thigh)
Capri and crop pants are acceptable for girls (plain, worn at the waist)

Skirts (girls only)

Plain tan, black, or navy skirts knee-length or longer

Shoes

Closed-toe shoes must be worn
Shoes with laces must be tied and Velcro must be fastened
Socks must be matching in color

Spirit and other free dress days will occur during designated days throughout the school year. These dates will be shared in the fall.

North Junior High Standard School Attire 2011-12

Shirts

Students must wear collared polo or oxford shirts.

Shirts can be solid in color or striped.

Shirts cannot be prints and they cannot have writing or pictures on them.

All shirts must have buttons on them.

Hooded sweatshirts, sweatshirts, jackets, oversized shirts and athletic wear are not permitted to be worn inside the school during the school day.

Crew neck sweatshirts or sweaters may be worn over the shirts for warmth.

Skirts

Skirts must be to the knee.

Pants

Students can wear solid colored slacks or jeans.

Slacks and jeans cannot have tears, frays, slits, or drag the floor.

Outside zippers, metal, studding, straps, patches, etc. are not allowed.

Cotton/flannel pants or pajamas are not allowed.

“Skinny” jeans or oversized jeans are not allowed.

Cargo style pants are not allowed.

Shorts

Students can wear knee length shorts.

Shorts can be worn from the beginning of school until Thanksgiving break and then not until the return from Spring Break.

Girls can also wear Capri style pants.

Shoes

Shoes must be worn with laces tied and fasteners fastened.

Boots allowed if covered by pant legs.

Flip-flops, shower shoes, and house shoes are not permissible.

Perry Heights Dress Code for 2011-12

Shirts

Any standard solid color Polo shirt (short or long sleeve) with no more than 4 buttons

Logos- Nothing larger than a silver dollar

Students may wear solid color long sleeve t-shirts under the Polo due to weather

Crew Neck solid color sweaters/sweatshirts may be worn over the Polo shirt due to weather

Jackets & coats are to be kept in lockers

Pants

Plain blue denim jeans

Khakis/Dress pants

Capris/Shorts/Skirts

Shorts & Skirts must be just above the knee

Footwear

All footwear must have a covered heel and toe

Academic Spirit Day

We will have Spirit Days on Administrative determined Fridays. On Spirit Days students will be allowed to wear t-shirts and hoodies that represent PHMS, Reitz, or any University.

All decisions about appropriate dress and grooming will be made by the school administration. Students in violation of the dress code will be required to correct the violation prior to admittance to class and could face further disciplinary action.

Plaza Park International Prep Academy 2011-12

Pants

Khaki or Navy solid color only. Uniform Style- pants, skirts, shorts, capris (girls)

Pants, shorts, and skirts must be plain in nature with no logos.

Pants, shorts, and skirts must not be too tight or too loose.

No blue jean or denim material is allowed.

Shorts and skirts must be uniform brand only, with no logos present anywhere on the outside of the clothing. No pocket flaps. No oversized shorts or skirts. Shorts and skirts must reach within two inches from the knees.

Pants should not be tucked in shoes, footwear, or rolled up.
Pants and shorts will be secured at the waist and cannot "sag."
Capri and crop pants without leg ties are acceptable for girls.
Cargo pants or any pants with pockets below the hip are not permitted.

Belts

All students will be required to wear belts and have the belts secured at the waist. Belts must be plain black or brown with a plain belt buckle that is not oversized. All belts must be buckled and worn appropriately.

Shirts and sweaters

Red, Navy, Gray, or White (school colors). Solid color golf/polo style or collared button down shirts acceptable. Shirts must be buttoned with the exception of the top button. Shirts can be long or short sleeve with a collar. Solid color sweaters, mock turtlenecks, turtlenecks, crewneck sweatshirts and vests are also permitted in the approved colors if worn over or under an approved polo style shirt.

Except for sweaters and sweatshirts, all other shirts must be tucked in at all times.

Hooded sweatshirts or jackets are not allowed to be worn inside the building.

T-shirts or long sleeve shirts worn under polo or approved apparel may not contain any graphics, writing, or embroidery and should be matching color, white, or gray.

The shirts should not contain **ANY** logo or brand name that is visible.

Shoes

Students cannot wear flip-flops, sandals, house shoes, jellies, or shoes with rollers. Shoes with strings or velcro must be fastened. Shoes must be worn at all times. All shoes should contain backs and be closed toe.

Accessories

Earrings (in the ear), and watches are the only acceptable forms of accessories.

Hair

Hair color and styles must not be distracting to the educational process.

Exceptions to the student dress code policy

Spirit Days - School logo shirts from Plaza Park, Hebron, Stockwell, and Harrison will be permitted on special days that are approved by the administration. The primary color of spirit wear shirts should be white, gray, navy, black, and red.

Picture Day - On Plaza Park's Picture Day, students may be granted approval by the administration to wear a shirt or blouse that adheres to the overall EVSC school dress code policy. Students will wear khaki or navy pants on School Picture Day.

Stockwell Elementary Dress for Success Code 2011-12

Pants

Khaki or navy pants, skirts, capris, or jumpers.

Shirts

Red, white, gray or blue polo-styled collared shirts and sweatshirts. We have had several community meetings and the information is on our school website.

Thompkins Middle School 2011-12

Shirts

Students will be wearing collared polo shirts, long or short sleeved or oxford style shirts with sleeves. Logos are to be limited to approximately 2 inches in size. Graphics will not be allowed on shirts. The shirts may be plain, striped, plaid, etc. No particular brand of shirt is required.

Sweatshirts

Hoodies and jackets will not be allowed during the school day. Crew neck sweat shirts or sweaters may be worn over the shirts for warmth. Long sleeve tee shirts can also be worn under the shirts for warmth. Graphics are not allowed on the shirts.

Pants

Students are not required to wear a particular style of pant, shoe, etc. The pants you choose for your student should be free of holes, worn about the waist and of appropriate length.

Spirit Days

There will be special occasions such as spirit days that would allow for the modification of the attire students wear. Schools will notify family of these special days.

Washington Middle School Modified Dress Code 2011-12

Tops

Short or long sleeve collared polo style or oxford style dress shirt in any solid color, with the exception of neon colors. School logos only are allowed. Shirts must be buttoned with the exception of the top button.

Shirts must be tucked in. A belt must be worn unless the pants have an elastic waist band.

Undershirts need to be a plain solid color, if worn.

Sweaters, crewneck sweatshirts and vests of any solid color are permitted when worn over a collared shirt.

Only school logos are allowed. Neon colors are not permitted.

Bottoms

Pants and shorts should be dress style, plain, in solid shades of tan, black, navy, or gray without holes or frays of any kind. Cargo pants are not permitted.

Pants, shorts, skirts, capris, and skorts should be *no less than 2 inches* above or below the knees.

Jeans, denim, or stretch material are not permitted.

Shoes

Shoes need to be safe, having a closed back and closed toe, and be worn properly. Flip-flops, slides, and house shoes are not permitted.

Other

General success rules: all clothing must be properly fitted, caps and head gear should be removed upon entering the school, piercings allowed in the ears only, hair should be kept neat, clean and non-distracting.

Spirit Days will be given throughout the year on designated dates. Students may wear sweatshirts, t-shirts, and/or hoodies displaying logos of WMS, Dexter, Harper, or Bosse only on Spirit Days.

Coats and backpacks need to be secured in lockers before homeroom and remain there until the end of the school day.

All decisions about appropriate dress and grooming will be made by the school administrators.

WEATHER RELATED SCHOOL CLOSINGS

All schools in the EVSC will be open on all regularly scheduled days unless closed by the EVSC Superintendent because of an emergency situation or inclement weather that makes driving or walking conditions unsafe. The school corporation will attempt to have schools open each day that road and weather conditions are considered safe for students.

On days of inclement weather when roads are considered to be unsafe for school bus transportation, the decision to close school is made by the Superintendent usually prior to 5:45 a.m. Decisions regarding schools closing are reached by school officials after traveling area roads between 3-5 a.m. In addition, information is received from the National Weather Service, Indiana State Police, Evansville Police Department, Vanderburgh County Sheriff, Indiana State and Vanderburgh County Highway Departments; as well as consultations with surrounding school districts.

When the decision is made to close, or if it is decided a delay of opening is in order, notification will be sent to all families and staff through the EVSC's Family Notification system, Connect-ED. This Outreach call will go to the primary method of communication listed by families and employees. It is important that this information is kept up-to-date. All local radio and television stations will also be notified at the time the decision is made. The news media generally begin making the announcement immediately and at frequent intervals, thereafter.

The following announcements may be made:

- All schools are closed.
- Schools will be open, but starting time may be delayed up to two hours.
- Schools will be open as usual, but bus transportation is provided **ONLY** on alternate routes. Alternate routes are those identified by the city and county officials as having first priority for clearing.
- On rare occasions, weather conditions may worsen sufficiently during the day as to require an early dismissal of students. Early dismissal may be necessary in order to get students home before inclement conditions make transportation hazardous. In order to prepare for this, parents should instruct children what to do should this occur.
- In some instances, schools will hold students until the threat of severe weather has passed before releasing them to parents or for the bus trip home. If this occurs, students **WILL NOT** be released to parents or be allowed to leave the school after they have been taken to their "safe" locations within the buildings, until an all-clear is given. Student and staff safety is the EVSC'S first and foremost concern.

Weather conditions are not always the same throughout the 241 square miles of Vanderburgh County; thus, it may be possible for most of our schools to remain open while some must be closed due to the terrain and

roads in the immediate vicinity. A map of road conditions throughout the county will be posted at www.evscschools.com

EACH PARENT HAS THE FINAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE CARE OF THEIR CHILD; THEREFORE, ON DAYS WHEN THE SCHOOL IS OPEN AND THE PARENT OR GUARDIAN FEELS THAT TRAVEL IS NOT SAFE, THE PARENT MAY CHOOSE TO KEEP THE STUDENT HOME. When this decision is made, the parent/guardian should send a note to school and the absence will be considered excused and time will be allowed for make-up work to be completed. The State of Indiana requires that all schools be open a minimum of 180 days.

One-Hour Delay

- Morning Southern Indiana Career and Technical Center classes and Early College High School classes will run one hour late.
- Extended Daycare Centers will be open at 6:30 a.m.
- International Newcomer's Academy for middle school students at Lodge Community School will be cancelled.
- Breakfast will be served.

Two-Hour Delay

- Morning and Afternoon Southern Indiana Career and Technical Center classes, as well as classes at Early College High School will run 9:40 a.m.-11:10 a.m. and 12:35 p.m.-2:25 p.m.
- Extended Day Care Centers will be open at the usual 6:30 a.m.
- Breakfast will be served to daycare students only.
- International Newcomer's Academy for middle school students at Lodge Community School will be cancelled.
- Pre-Kindergarten classes at Daniel Wertz and the Culver Family Learning Center will be cancelled. Morning session of Developmental Pre-School will be canceled, as well, but the EARC, Rehab, and Developmental Pre-School afternoon classes will operate on schedule.

Early Dismissal

- If dismissed on or before noon, Extended Daycare Centers will not open. Parents will be notified to pick up children. If dismissal occurs after noon, the Ed Centers will remain open on a regular schedule.

EARLY KINDERGARTEN ENTRY

FULL-DAY KINDERGARTEN SCHEDULE:

LINCOLN SCHOOL (K-8) ENROLLMENT

Year Round Education (**YRE**) is a reorganization of the school calendar with instructional blocks and vacations distributed throughout the 180-day calendar year so that learning is continuous. The Lincoln School calendar is an alternative calendar. **Students will only attend school the instructional days that are listed on the Lincoln Elementary calendar.** First day of school for Lincoln will be Wednesday, July 20, 2011. Lincoln offers a full-day kindergarten program. Start time is 7:55 a.m. and school will dismiss at 2:40 p.m.

Lincoln students will:

- Have mini-vacations during all four seasons.
- Have the same holidays as all other EVSC students.
- Have all the services offered at other elementary schools such as: Extended Day Program, breakfast, lunch, and bus transportation.
- Have the option of attending fall, spring, and summer intersessions.

If parents choose the YRE program for their child, **they have made a year-long commitment.** If students move out of the district, transportation to and from Lincoln Elementary School will be provided. If parents living within the Lincoln Elementary School district do not want the YRE Program, an alternative enrollment will be provided at either Cedar Hall Community School (K-8) or Stringtown Elementary School.

Intersession - An optional two-week enrichment program:

Students will attend school four grading periods with breaks between each grading period. **Intersessions occur in the fall, spring, and summer.** Enrichment and remediation classes will be available to all students. The student day during the intersession will be 4 1/2 hours. Each 2-week intersession is followed by a 1-week vacation.

Intersession programs are optional and designed for fun as well as learning. Students are assessed, but do not receive grades.

Vacation:

1-week of vacation in both the fall and spring and a 4-week vacation in the summer.

Before and After School Daycare

The ED Center (Extended Day) program is available before and after school, as well as day-long care during the intersessions. The Ed Center will not be in session during the fall, winter, or spring breaks, scheduled holidays, or days of inclement weather when all EVSC schools are closed.

DISTRIBUTION OF NETBOOK COMPUTERS

The EVSC is beginning its third year of the one-to-one laptop initiative at the high school level and first year at the middle grades level, providing a netbook to all students in grades 6 through 12.

Through the Indiana Department of Education, laptop computers are considered as textbooks (a learning tool), and the EVSC will treat the netbooks in the same manner. The process and protocols that are already in place for textbooks will also be utilized for netbooks. This includes bar-coding, inventory, distribution, and repair/replacement. Once the textbooks and netbooks are in the student's possession, they are responsible for the care of both.

Netbook distribution will take place at the school level and on each individual school's schedule after the start of school.

Students will be responsible for the care of the netbook and for attention to the Digital Citizenship classes and information they are given to ensure that it is not damaged and the netbook is used in a responsible manner. If damage or other problems with the netbook occur, the student should report the problem to the school building support technician who will assess the damage and initiate a repair ticket.

All parents should consider insuring their student's netbook for loss or theft. An updated contract with Dell will provide accidental damage coverage to the netbook model being used in the middle schools.

Insurance options may be available through an individual homeowner policy or other insurance companies. One option available for students, faculty and staff, is *Student Insurance Partners*. This company provides laptop/tablet insurance which covers replacement cost and protects the laptop worldwide. Students/parents are responsible for completing and submitting the optional insurance application and submitting a claim to the insurance company if needed.
